




The Human Body: If the Shoe Fits

Week 1: Using curiosity to care for others

Our very first week of the summer students dove into what it means to be a rehabilitative engineer. One of the main design challenges was how to make a shoe comfortable for people with different types of arches. Watching how natural it was for students to combine their genuine concern for others with their new STEM skills as they solved each other's problems was truly a refreshing start to such an unusual summer.



Electricity: Alarming Energy

Week 4: Making the impossible possible

As students designed, tested, and rebuilt their model circuits several groups noticed there were several configurations they initially thought were possible that just didn't work. We challenged campers to hack their designs and make adjustments and by the end of the week campers had created dozens of diagrams, tested prototypes, and fixed their circuit sets to accomplish what they thought was not possible.



Virtual Reality: Into the Unknown

Week 6: Using creativity to explore the unthinkable

In our final week students used technology to enhance their creative potential by learning Computer-aided Design (CAD) skills and using virtual reality (VR) to refine design concepts. Watching the way students seamlessly incorporated technology to build and expand their ideas for thrones, mazes, three-story dog houses, and much more was a treat for us to see unfold with our partners at UNL's Johnny Carson Center for Emerging Media Arts.

Giving a much-needed summer outlet to curiosity, learning, and inspiration.

The 2020 Spark season started at the end of a wholly unprecedented school year that left kids especially hungry to learn and play together. The need for kids to interact and learn with their peers was the driving force for our team to develop a summer plan unlike any before.

When asked if we should even open this year our enrolled families answered with a resounding:

"Yes, BUT...only with the right precautions."

This introduced a multitude of challenges we needed to overcome—running a summer camp in the middle of a global pandemic required creativity at its highest-level. So, that's exactly what we did, which set the following new guidelines and wheels in motion so kids could learn, interact, and remain healthy. Safety dictated that we cut four out of 10 weeks of camp, move to an entirely new site, ensure one dedicated teacher per classroom, and implement new procedures for meal and snack times.
