COLLEGE AND CAREER

Amazing opportunities await students at The Career Academy (TCA) this year. Students took their first steps into the brand new school building at Southeast Community College's Lincoln campus in August. Forging meaningful and productive learning experiences, tailored to fit their aspirations, these students have the potential to address real job demand needs within our business community. The Foundation's partnership with TCA is directly linked to this pillar of "College And Career."



Community involvement is the cornerstone of authentic experience for students and the key to a dynamic and impactful program. Working together, instructors and businesses are creating hands-on early exposure to high-demand careers that can launch students into professional success.

Immersion in one of 16 different career pathways allows students to work with industry leaders and to understand what it would be like to pursue a particular career path. They are challenged to collaborate across disciplines on relevant cutting-edge projects. We are already beginning to see students thrive at TCA after just one semester.

Jade Blizek and Kealy Barnes are the first generation of students to graduate from this specialized program at The Career Academy. Both Kealy and Jade have interesting insights on how TCA is going to help Lincoln students reach their full potential.

Jade, who is currently studying welding, had a battle with cancer early in his life. This experience shaped his goals, and helped him appreciate unique opportunities. Because of this, he is certain that TCA is an excellent fit for him. "We all want to be here, we're excited to come every day...if I miss the bus, I'm not going to stay home, I'm going to find my way here and weld, because that's what I want to do" said Jade.

Kealy is in the health sciences pathway, and is motivated by her mother's difficult recovery from a surgery. She is driven to be a great healthcare provider, for people like her mom.

In the first few weeks, Kealy has learned how to give vaccinations, administer IV drips and draw blood. She has spoken with nurses, EMTs and other healthcare professionals about what the job is like in real life.

Both students believe their classes are informative and interesting, They say, the connection with the business community is key. Over 130 businesses are participating in TCA through volunteerism or financial support.



TCA is up and running, doing great work with students thanks to the generous donors and local businesses who made it happen. Additional resources are needed to ensure a strong future for TCA. Support comes from sponsorships that construct valuable student experiences, provide state of the art equipment and allow students to attend TCA through tuition assistance. To date \$1.2M has been donated or pledged over the next three years. We still have quite a way to go to reach our goal of \$2.2M and great sponsorship opportunities exist across most of the pathways.

These sponsorships provide experiences that traditional funding sources cannot.

STRONG, STABLE FAMILIES

Family literacy has a powerful premise: Parents are their children's first and most important teachers.

An investment in a family's education is an investment in our community's financial and cultural future. Family literacy programs believe in engaging families in the learning process and sharing lessons with parents - recognizing they will pass along those lessons to their children. At the Foundation, we believe family literacy is a compelling way to help build "Strong, Stable Families" – one of our four pillars.

What is family literacy?

Family literacy is a nationally-recognized and innovative educational approach with a powerful premise. It brings students and families together to learn - challenging parents, guardians and their children to identify academic and life goals that will improve the quality of their lives. Family literacy impacts the entire community. Research shows a mother's reading skill is the greatest determinant of her children's future academic success, outweighing other factors such as neighborhood and family income.

- Children who have parents who help them learn to read score 10 points higher on standardized reading tests.
- When moms and dads earn high school diplomas or college diplomas – they increase the family earning power, but even more importantly, change and continue a family's cycle of literacy and educational achievement.

When parents and children go to school together, the entire community benefits.

Family literacy programs have been implemented in nine Title 1 school buildings in Lincoln Public Schools, but we need your help to support this program and help it thrive. Family literacy at LPS provides several components for mothers and fathers. During part of the school day, adults receive basic lessons in language and literacy, as well as parenting skills. The rest of the school day, they spend time in their children's classrooms, learning math right alongside them.

Upon program completion, parents are more likely to:

- Feel confident helping their children in school
- Read to their children
- Conference with teachers
- Volunteer in the classroom

Did you know?

- More than 60 different languages are spoken by LPS students and families.
- 29% of LPS students report an ethnicity other than White (7 schools are "minority majority schools").
- 43% of LPS students live in poverty (that number is 70% in the 14 highest poverty schools).
- More than 2,300 students are learning English as a second, third, or fourth language.

The results are powerful:

- 200% increase in English acquisition by parents at their children's schools
- 275% increase in parents reading in English to their children
- 222% increase in parent volunteerism in schools

Teachers report that students involved in the Family Literacy Program at LPS are more likely:

- To have good or excellent family support
- To have good or excellent classroom behavior
- To have future success in school

Family Literacy programs have broad impact by fostering development of the connecting language in our increasingly globalized community. This program works, the results are generational, and we are just getting started!



\$1 million is lost to a community per year for *each student* who does not graduate from high school.

We love to find ways that our donors can connect their passions to student needs. Diana and Lloyd Roberts are excellent examples of how this can make a huge difference in the lives of students with The Doane Leadership Conference, which they are sending them

to for the first time this year.

The Roberts have a long history of support with the Foundation. They've given generously to the Lincoln community to honor the memory of their daughter, Brooke D. Roberts, a Lincoln East graduate. Recently, Diana and Lloyd have focused their efforts towards Elliott and Hartley Elementary Schools. Part of this focus is being able to reach

students early in life, helping them grow as leaders. This was a core belief held by Brooke.

Diana and Lloyd feel that students today face many new pressures (whether from technology, social media, or elsewhere). Further, they believe the best way to prepare students for these new challenges is to give them opportunities to learn valuable lessons outside of the classroom, then take those lessons back into their schools. The Doane Leadership Conference focuses on developing critical thinking and self-confidence for 4th – 6th grade students. Diana and Lloyd's enthusiasm for the conference comes from their belief that it will create students who are thoughtful, less impulsive, and able to lead their fellow students. Their goal is to be a positive influence that creates long-term change in students' lives by reminding them to forge their own path and inspire their peers.

According to Lloyd, in the many years they have supported LPS through the Foundation, the most

fulfilling aspect is seeing students take ahold of the opportunities they're given, and watching them further their education.

Diana and Lloyd want to commend the principals of Hartley and Elliott Elementary for their hard work, and to note how much the LPS faculty members care about their students. By working closely with these principals, they have supported

students from each school to attend the leadership conference.

Says Lloyd, "I've traveled all over for my job, and I haven't found anywhere else that has a better setting for their school system than Lincoln, Nebraska. The support from the community, the administration...I can't believe all the work our teachers do. I've had chances to move my family to other areas, but nowhere compares to Lincoln."

NEXT-LEVEL LEARNING

Every two or three years, the Lincoln Youth Symphony (LYS) takes an overseas trip to share their music, and to give the youth involved the chance to experience a different nation's culture. As a part of the American Celebration of Music in Ireland, LYS will be playing several concerts in Ireland this coming March. The trip will highlight a number of heritage sites on the Emerald Isle, and students will have the opportunity to share their music at St. Anne's Cathedral, and St. Nicholas Collegiate Cathedral.

Clark Potter, the conductor of LYS, is excited that the trip will be part of an important cultural exchange between different nations. "Music is a way to give to communities, and I'm really grateful for this opportunity."

These kinds of experiences help youth to understand their world better, and give them confidence in their ability to take on challenges as they learn to get around in a country different than their own. For many students, this trip will be their first time out of the country.

Senior Isabella Spaulding said, "We get to travel together as a group and perform in really cool places that have historical significance in terms of music."

The beauty of performing in this kind of environment is that it allows students to see that music is truly a universal language and crosses barriers of culture and language. Next-Level Learning, one of our four pillars at the Foundation, allows learning to happen outside of the classroom and gives students new



experiences which benefit them in many different ways. Bringing a new perspective back into these students' every day lives is valuable for the entire community.

Unique costs are associated with transporting an entire orchestra, and Foundation funds help make this possible. Because it's impractical to bring a bass or cello onto a plane, they'll be renting many instruments in Ireland. LYS is also hoping to sponsor the entire trip for a handful of students who would not be able to go on their own, so that everyone can benefit from this journey.






